Explanation

1. B) She had entered in the middle of the session and was still catching up with

B is correct because the passage states Ria "had joined the new school in the middle of the session and was having trouble grasping the lessons," which directly connects late entry with low marks.

A is incorrect: the text never compares marking standards between schools.

C is incorrect: there is no mention of Ria disliking the curriculum.

D is incorrect: her parents note she has "lost interest in activities," not that she ignores homework.

A) Ria's mother, because Ira defended Ria when Lipi challenged the essay marks.
A is correct: After Ira quarrels with Lipi, Ria's mother says, "She must be a true friend of yours then!" recognising Ira's loyalty.

B is incorrect: the teacher is never quoted praising Ira.

C is incorrect: Pritika meets Ria only after Ira disappears.

D is incorrect: Lipi does not admire Ira; she argues with her.

3. B) Pritika arrived, became her seat-mate, and filled the need for a real friend.

B is correct: Once Pritika joins the class, Ria's stories revolve around her, and Ira is forgotten. **A** is incorrect: the teacher, not Ira, decides new seating, but Ira's absence predates any transfer note.

C is incorrect: no academic failure of Ira is described.

D is incorrect: the teacher never prohibits conversation with Ira specifically.

4. C) Ira never existed; she was an imaginary friend invented by Ria.

C is correct: Ria later admits Ira was a fictional character she created.

A is incorrect: the teacher says she has "never had a girl named Ira," not that attendance was low.

B is incorrect: the teacher's denial shows Ira was never enrolled, not transferred.

D is incorrect: there is no hint of an alias in the narrative.

5. D) To comfort herself and ease her parents' worries while she had no real friends.

D is correct: Ria confesses she "made her up" because she "could see that my friendless state was beginning to bother you and daddy...[and] to amuse myself."

A is incorrect: the passage ties Ira to loneliness, not grades.

C is incorrect: no evidence suggests Ria sought academic advantage.

B is incorrect: Ira appears before any rivalry with Lipi.

6. B) Exultant

Miserable conveys extreme unhappiness; *exultant* means filled with triumphant joy—its direct opposite.

A Despondent – near-synonym, not an antonym.

C Tentative – relates to hesitation, not mood.

D Obscure – refers to lack of clarity or fame, unrelated to emotion.

7. D) Commended

Reprimanded means scolded; commended means formally praised—the opposite reaction. A Admonished, C Rebuked, B Censured – all synonyms or near-synonyms of reprimanded, not opposites.

8. B) Glower

B is correct: A *scowl* is an angry, furrow-browed look; to *glower* is to stare angrily in the same way.

A Beam – a broad smile, opposite expression.

C Grin – simple smile, not angry.


D Sneer – shows contempt with a raised lip, different nuance from a scowl.

9. C) Slightly

Trifle means "to a small extent"; slightly conveys the same modest degree. A Massively, B Considerably, D Radically – all imply large or significant degree, contradicting "trifle."

10. B) Become more outgoing and confident

The idiom refers to a shy person growing sociable, matching Ria's transformation.



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
