Basic structure: On the Mysuru Dasara festival

There can be no restriction in a public event on the basis of religion

The Supreme Court of India recently reaffirmed that secularism is a fundamental principle and part of the basic structure of the Constitution of India. While this is a welcome restatement, it is concerning that the Court has to periodically reiterate this foundational aspect of Indian nationhood. The need arose from a misguided petition that sought to communalise a moment of celebration for all Indians. The Karnataka government had invited International Booker Prize-winning Kannada writer Banu Mushtaq, who is Muslim, to inaugurate the Mysuru Dasara festival at the Chamundeshwari Temple which she did on Monday. This festival, a State-sponsored cultural event that is not purely religious, serves as an occasion for all communities to come together and share in the joy of the festival. The petition filed in the Court alleged that Ms. Mushtag's participation violated Articles 25 and 26 of the Constitution, which guarantee freedom of religion. A Bench of Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta rightly dismissed the petition, clarifying that the Dasara festival is a State event, not a private religious ceremony. The Court emphasised that the State cannot discriminate based on religion when organising public events and questioned whether the petitioner had even read the Constitution's Preamble, which unambiguously promotes equality and secularism. The Karnataka High Court had previously upheld the government's decision, stating that a person of one faith participating in the events of another does not violate anyone's constitutional right.

The constitutional right to practise and profess religion cannot be interpreted as a right to restrict others from participating in a faith's practices. Restricting participation in any public gathering based on religion is indefensible in a pluralistic society. Although some places of worship still limit access to certain groups, such practices remain a source of legal and ethical debate. Those who perceive a threat to their religion from someone who is voluntarily and happily joining its festivities are either cynical or cunning. In fact, over many centuries and across different geographies, festivals and pilgrimages have united India's diverse population, often transcending social barriers. The acceptance of this shared, mixed cultural heritage is a common thread among all Indian political parties, even amid their disagreements. However, a new group of political opportunists is exploiting this harmony by creating communal rifts, turning the logic of coexistence on its head. As the Supreme Court has demonstrated, these individuals need to be held accountable. [Practice Exercise]

Q directly relates to India's stance on BRICS expansion and quotes Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

R talks about a moment in France where the Indian armed forces were honored, which is unrelated to the BRICS summit.

S directly mentions that enlargement or expansion was a major challenge at the Johannesburg summit, which aligns with the context of S1.

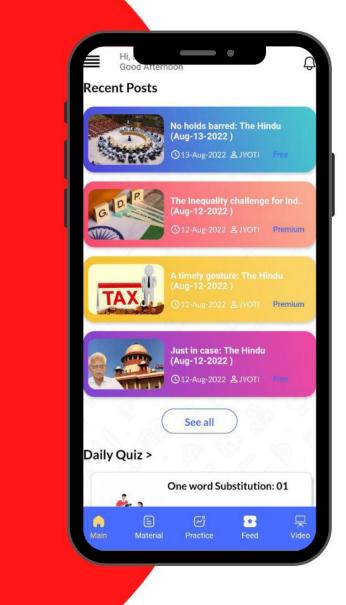

 क्योंकि past-unreal conditional में if-clause Past Perfect लेती है; 'would have' मुख्य clause में रहता
 है।
 - In past-unreal conditionals, the if-clause takes Past Perfect. Use "had been implemented" in the if-clause; keep "would have" in the main clause.
 Like— If the scheme had been implemented effectively, all affected would have benefited.

- 21. C) 'In' का use होगा क्योंकि यह विशेष तारीख या समय को दर्शाता है। Sentence में बताया गया है कि Milton Hershey ने 1905 में अपनी चॉकलेट मेन्युफैक्चरिंग प्लांट खोली थी, इसलिए 'in' यहाँ सही है। 'To', 'At', और 'On' इस context में ठीक नहीं होंगे क्योंकि 'To' का इस्तेमाल दिशा या स्थल के लिए होता है, 'At' किसी विशिष्ट स्थान या समय के लिए और 'On' किसी विशेष दिन या तारीख को दर्शाने के लिए होता है।
 - 'In' should be used because it indicates a specific period or point in time. The sentence states that Milton Hershey opened his chocolate manufacturing plant in 1905, making 'in' the correct choice here. 'To' would be incorrect as it's typically used for direction or place, 'At' is used for a specific location or time, and 'On' is used to indicate specific days or dates, which don't fit this context.
- 22. D) Needed' का use होगा क्योंकि "needed" का अर्थ होता है किसी चीज़ की आवश्यकता होना।
 Sentence में यह दिखाया गया है कि Milton Hershey को उसके चॉकलेट बनाने के लिए ताज़ा दूध की
 आवश्यकता थी, इसलिए 'Needed' यहाँ पर सही है। 'Considered' का अर्थ है किसी चीज़ को सोचना या
 मानना, 'Kneaded' का अर्थ है गुंदना, और 'Distributed' का अर्थ है वितरित करना, जो इस context में
 सही नहीं है।
 - 'Needed' should be used because it means requiring something. In the sentence, it is shown that Milton Hershey required fresh milk to produce his finest milk chocolate, making 'needed' appropriate here. Whereas, 'Considered' means to think about or regard something, 'Kneaded' means to mix and work into a uniform mass, and 'Distributed' means to give out or disperse, which are not fitting in this context.
- 23. A) That' का use होगा क्योंकि "that" यहाँ एक relative pronoun के रूप में काम कर रहा है जो 'plant' को refer कर रहा है। Sentence में कहा गया है कि plant जो एक छोटे Pennsylvania गाँव में खोला गया था, वह आज दुनिया की सबसे बड़ी चाँकलेट फैक्टरी है। जबकि 'When', 'Who', और 'What' इस context में सही नहीं हैं।
 - 'That' should be used because it is acting as a relative pronoun referring to the 'plant' in the sentence. The sentence states that the plant opened in a small Pennsylvania village is today the largest chocolate factory in the world. Whereas, 'When', 'Who', and 'What' are not correct in this context.
- 24. C) largest' का use होगा क्योंकि यहाँ पर बात हो रही है दुनिया की सबसे बड़ी चॉकलेट फैक्ट्री की। 'Most largest' गलत है क्योंकि 'most' और 'largest' दोनों superlative degree में हैं और एक ही sentence में इनका उपयोग नहीं हो सकता। 'Large' और 'Larger' comparative degree में हैं और इस context में फिट नहीं बैठते।
 - 'largest' should be used because it is referring to the biggest chocolate factory in the world. 'Most largest' is incorrect because 'most' and 'largest' are both in the superlative degree and cannot be used together in a sentence. 'Large' and 'Larger' are in the comparative degree and don't fit in this context.

- 25. B) favourites' का use होगा क्योंकि "favourites" का अर्थ होता है पसंदीदा या लोकप्रिय। Sentence में बताया गया है कि वहां बनाई गई मिठाइयां पूरी दुनिया में पसंद की जाती हैं, इसलिए 'favourites' यहाँ सही है। जबकि 'choices' का अर्थ होता है विकल्प, 'collections' का अर्थ होता है संग्रह, और 'Selections' का अर्थ होता है चयन, जो इस context में सही नहीं हैं।
 - 'favourites' should be used because it means something that is preferred or popular. The sentence mentions that the confections created at the plant are popular around the world, making 'favourites' the correct choice here. Whereas, 'choices' means options, 'collections' means a group of things, and 'Selections' means the act of choosing or something that is chosen, which don't fit in this context.



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
