Labour of care: On the Anshakalin Stri Parichars, women community health workers

Women who facilitate rural health care should get better wages

For decades, the women who serve as Anshakalin Stri Parichars (ASPs) in Maharashtra have been performing some of the hardest, yet least acknowledged, labour in the rural health system. For a wide breadth of responsibility, their monthly wage has stagnated at ₹3,000 since 2016, decades behind inflation. They also lack job security, pensions, safety gear and travel allowance. In 2023, a labour court in Nagpur acknowledged that they deserved at least the protection of the Minimum Wages Act but left the decision to the State. In keeping with its verbal-only assurances, the State has even now only promised them ₹6,000 a month by December 2025 — much less than what multi-purpose health workers receive. The indifference is not accidental: ASPs, who predate Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHA) and anganwadi workers, have been easy to ignore because they are poor, rural women. Their neglect reveals a gendered and caste-inflected hierarchy of labour within public health, where skilled work is low status and devalued because of who performs it. Their ongoing protests are part of an arc of agitation following similar sit-ins in Kolhapur, Nagpur, Ratnagiri and Yavatmal. In this regard, their plight resonates with that of ASHAs in other States. ASHAs, created under the National Rural Health Mission in 2005, are the community's first link to the health system and are also officially classified as "volunteers" rather than employees, compensated only through oft-delayed incentives, amounting to less than subsistence. Across States, ASHAs have repeatedly agitated for fixed honoraria, recognition as government staff and social security, and, like the ASPs' protests, have borne the same refrain: States cannot continue to build their health systems on the underpaid labour of women.

These struggles highlight a structural contradiction. While India relies heavily on women community health workers and attendants to deliver maternal and child health care, immunisation and disease surveillance, especially in rural areas, it refuses to recognise them as workers entitled to minimum benefits and dignity. The reliance is often framed as offering rural women "opportunities" for public service. Yet, in practice, it is exploitation. These women risk snakebite while clearing hospital grounds and death in accidents en route to vaccination duty without insurance or compensation. A health system that does not value the people who keep it functional and link its margins to formal care is bound to sabotage itself. To secure rural health is to secure the rights of those women through living wages, safe working conditions and stable employment.

- 1. Anshakalin Stri Parichars (ASPs) in Maharashtra have been essential to rural healthcare for decades.

Explanations

1. B) Challenges of women community health workers and their exploitation

The central theme is the plight of women health workers (ASPs and ASHAs) — underpaid, undervalued, and exploited — and how their protests reflect a structural failure of India's rural health system.

- A (Cultural preservation) Irrelevant; the passage is about health workers, not cultural roles.
- C (Rural economy) Too broad; while rural health connects to the economy, the passage specifically focuses on labour exploitation in health care, not economy-building.
- D (Healthcare technology) Wrong; no mention of new medical technologies, only the labour conditions of women workers.

2. B) The government relies on their work but systematically undervalues it.

The passage highlights that ASPs and ASHAs form the backbone of rural healthcare but are underpaid, lack job security, and are treated as "volunteers" rather than workers. This clearly shows systematic undervaluation despite reliance on their work.

- A) Incorrect because the passage says their wages are stagnant, benefits are denied, and recognition is absent.
- C) Incorrect because they explicitly lack pensions, insurance, safety gear, and allowances.
- D) Incorrect because there is no mention of replacing them with multi-purpose health workers; rather, they are compared unfavourably in terms of pay.
- 3. C) Because they are poor, rural women belonging to marginalized groups.

The passage clearly states that ASPs' neglect reveals a gendered and caste-inflected hierarchy of labour in public health, meaning their social background (poor, rural, women) has contributed to their being overlooked.

- A) Incorrect, because they are not highly paid; they have extremely low wages.
- B) Incorrect, because ASPs predate ASHAs; it was ASHAs who were created under the 2005 National Rural Health Mission.
- D) Incorrect, because the passage states they have been actively protesting in Kolhapur, Nagpur, Ratnagiri, and Yavatmal.

4. D) The ASPs, who predate ASHA workers, have been ignored by the State.

D is correct because the subject ASPs is plural, so "have been ignored" is grammatically correct, and the relative clause "who predate" correctly matches plural subject.

A is wrong: "has been" should be "have been" because ASPs is plural; also "since decades" is incorrect, it should be "for decades".

B is wrong: "predates" is singular verb, but subject ASPs is plural; also "is being ignored" suggests only present continuous, but the context requires present perfect continuous/passive.

C is wrong: "have demanding" is incorrect; it should be "have been demanding".

5. A) Sabotage

sabotage is correct because the passage clearly states that a system ignoring its workers will "sabotage itself." It matches the critical tone of neglect and exploitation.

- B (celebrate) is incorrect because the context is about exploitation, not celebration.

7. B) **DBAC**

D starts the paragraph by introducing the subject "The olive tree" and its action of ridiculing the fig tree. This sets the context for the comparison between the two trees.

B follows D as it introduces the next event—a shower of snow falling on them. The pronoun "them" refers back to the olive and fig trees mentioned in D, maintaining coherence.

A comes after B because it describes the consequence of the snow settling on the olive tree's branches, leading to its destruction. The phrase "At length" indicates a progression of events after the snow has fallen.

C logically concludes the paragraph by showing the contrasting fate of the fig tree, which remained unharmed because it had no leaves. This completes the comparison introduced in D. In Hindi:

B follows D because it defines the term "global warming" (introduced in D) by explaining what it means: "The term is used to describe the unnatural rise in earth's average temperature." This provides clarity on the subject.

C comes next as it introduces the primary cause of global warming ("Increased carbon dioxide"), logically following the definition. It establishes a cause-effect relationship: "Increased carbon dioxide is the primary driver of global warming."

A concludes the paragraph by adding secondary reasons alongside carbon dioxide, expanding on the causes mentioned in C. It acts as a supporting detail: "There are many secondary reasons as well along with increasing levels of carbon."

In Hindi:

D paragraph की शुरुआत करता है क्योंकि यह मुख्य subject "Global warming" को introduce करता है और इसे "पृथ्वी पर जीवन के लिए सबसे बड़ा खतरा" बताता है। यह central topic स्थापित करता है।

'prefer coffee to tea' will be used instead of 'prefer coffee than tea' because the correct idiomatic usage is prefer A to B, not 'than.'

Like— She prefers novels to short stories.

20. B) Infinitive verb

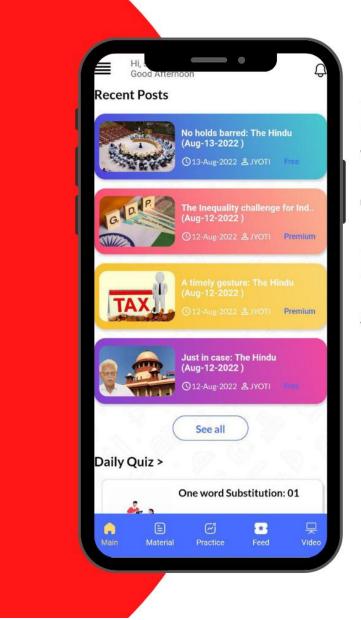
- "to + V1" = infinitive functioning as a noun (subject of the sentence). यहाँ "to swim" वाक्य का कर्ता है—infinitive (verbal noun).
- 21. B) **Studying'** का use होगा क्योंकि यहाँ 'spend years' के साथ 'ing' form का verb आता है, जिसका अर्थ है किसी कार्य को लम्बे समय तक करना। Sentence में कहा गया है कि ब्राह्मण ने कई वर्षों तक प्राचीन पुस्तकों का अध्ययन किया, इसलिए 'studying' यहाँ सही है। जबकि 'to study' infinitive form है, 'studied' past tense है, और 'study' base form है, जो इस context में सही नहीं हैं
 - **Studying'** should be used because it is the gerund form used with 'spend years,' indicating a prolonged activity. The sentence states that the Brahmin spent many years studying the ancient books, making 'studying' the correct choice here. Whereas, 'to study' is the infinitive form, 'studied' is the past tense, and 'study' is the base form, which don't fit in this context
- 22. D) 'Who' का use होगा क्योंकि 'who' का अर्थ होता है जो, और यहाँ पर learned priests के बारे में बताया गया है जो शहर का दौरा करते हैं। 'Who' यहाँ सही है क्योंकि यह व्यक्तियों के लिए इस्तेमाल होता है, और यहाँ 'who' learned priests के बारे में बता रहा है। जबकि 'Whom' का इस्तेमाल तब होता है जब व्यक्ति object के रूप में हो, 'Which' और 'That' non-human objects या concepts के लिए इस्तेमाल होते हैं।
 - **Who'** should be used because it refers to 'learned priests' who visit the city. 'Who' is correct here as it is used for individuals, and here it is talking about the priests. Whereas 'Whom' is used when the person is in the object position, and 'Which' and 'That' are used for non-human objects or concepts.
- 23. D) **Obtained'** का use होगा क्योंकि "obtained" का अर्थ होता है कुछ प्राप्त करना, खासकर मेहनत या प्रयास के बाद। Sentence में mention किया गया है कि ब्राह्मण ने कई सालों की मेहनत के बाद एक विशेष मंत्र का ज्ञान प्राप्त किया, इसलिए 'Obtained' यहाँ सही है। जबकि 'Found' का अर्थ है खोजना, 'Took' का अर्थ है लेना, और 'Used' का अर्थ है इस्तेमाल करना, जो इस context में सही नहीं है
 - **Obtained'** should be used because it means to acquire something, especially after an effort. The sentence mentions that the Brahmin gained the knowledge of a certain spell after much effort, making 'Obtained' fitting here. Whereas, 'Found' means to discover, 'Took' means to take, and 'Used' implies utilization, which don't fit in this context
- 24. C) **Very'** का use होगा क्योंकि "very" का अर्थ होता है बहुत या अत्यधिक, जो यहाँ उपयुक्त है। Sentence में mention किया गया है कि वह व्यक्ति अपनी प्राप्त ज्ञान के लिए बहुत गर्व महसूस

करता है, इसलिए 'very' यहाँ सही है। जबिक 'A lot' और 'Much' का अर्थ होता है बहुत सारा, और 'Many' का अर्थ होता है कई, जो इस context में सही नहीं है।

Very' should be used because it means extremely or highly, which is appropriate here. The sentence mentions that he was very proud of his acquired knowledge, making 'very' the right choice. Whereas, 'A lot' and 'Much' imply a large amount, and 'Many' means several, which don't fit in this context

25. D) Carefully' का use होगा क्योंकि "carefully" का अर्थ होता है किसी चीज को ध्यानपूर्वक और सावधानी से संभालना। sentence में mention किया गया है कि ब्राह्मण अपने ज्ञान को गर्व से संभाल रहा है और अपने रहस्य की रक्षा कर रहा है, इसलिए 'carefully' यहाँ सही है। जबकि 'Deeply' का अर्थ है गहराई से, 'Excitedly' का अर्थ है उत्साह से, और 'Gradually' का अर्थ है धीरे-धीरे, जो इस context में सही नहीं है

Carefully' should be used because it means to handle something with attention and caution. The sentence mentions that the Brahmin is proudly guarding his knowledge and protecting his secret, making 'carefully' fitting here. Whereas, 'Deeply' means in a deep manner, 'Excitedly' means with excitement, and 'Gradually' means slowly, which don't fit in this context.



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
