The more fractured the world becomes, the stronger the case for India's strategic autonomy

In a couple of speeches this week on Delhi's **diplomatic** challenges, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar **elaborated** on several **essential** concepts that are being **debated amid** a sense of greater uncertainty in India's foreign policy, **thanks to** the new difficulties in **ties** with the US. Jaishankar **seeks** to define India's **much-vaunted** "strategic autonomy" not as an **abstract** ambition or as **an end in itself**. He sees it as a **pragmatic** methodology for India's engagement with the major powers at a time of significant change in the **inter-se** relations of the US, Europe, Russia, and China. He reminds us that Delhi did not **align with** any one power even when India was much weaker in the early **decades** after Independence. As India has become stronger, its **emphasis** on seeking freedom of choice **is** not a slogan but **intrinsic** to its great power relations. He **insists** that **the objective** of strategic autonomy **is** to use relations with all the major powers to **accelerate** India's rise and emerge as an important pole in the international system.

Jaishankar underlines that strategic autonomy is not automatic. It is linked deeply to India's adaptability and resilience. He argues that "handling change continuously... means you have to keep revising, keep refreshing, keep adjusting, keep recalculating... and you can't do that if you are tied to somebody else". Put simply, the methodology of strategic autonomy depends on active and dynamic assessment of the external environment. Jaishankar cautions against conflating strategic autonomy with indecision. In the recent past, India had often paralysed itself in addressing the new strategic opportunities. According to Jaishankar, the more fractured the world becomes, the stronger the case for strategic autonomy — India must avoid "sitting on the fence", but also resist being coerced into taking sides simply for the sake of alignment.

Jaishankar addressed the growing concern in foreign policy circles about the emerging "rehyphenation" with Pakistan. Over the last two decades, India had successfully separated itself from the Pakistan factor. The unanticipated warmth between the Trump Administration and Pakistan in the last few weeks, and the US President's claims about brokering peace between India and Pakistan in the four-day conflict in May, have been at the source of this anxiety. Jaishankar underlines the importance of crafting foreign policy without being boxed in by adversarial neighbours or externally imposed equivalences. Citing historical comparisons made between India and Pakistan in the 1970s, he notes that such equivalences have dissipated primarily thanks to India's growth and international salience. As he put it, "The best way of de-hyphenation is to outstrip the other party in terms of power and capability." With India's economy now 10 times larger than Pakistan's, any talk of hyphenation is meaningless. Yet it is the Pakistan obsession of the ruling party — including the politicisation of cricket matches — that is producing Delhi's self-induced hyphenation with Islamabad. The drumbeat of anti-Pakistan rhetoric in Delhi signals a lack of political self-assurance, and worse still, it provides political oxygen at home and abroad to an army-led government that captured power through a rigged election

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in Islamabad. **Separating** the Pakistan policy from the domestic political **calculus** of the ruling party **is** the best guarantor of preventing India's re-hyphenation with Pakistan. **[Practice Exercise]**

The verb is transformed from the passive form to the active form, ensuring correct tense usage. In the passive sentence "The entire cake was eaten by Maria," the subject is "The entire cake," the verb is "was eaten" (Past Simple Passive), and the agent is "by Maria." When transformed into the active voice, "Maria" becomes the subject, and the verb is changed to "ate" (Past Simple Active). Thus, the correct answer is: Maria ate the entire cake.
- 17. D) Elegy (noun) A poem of lamentation, especially for the dead. शोक-गीत
 - Essay (noun) A short piece of writing on a particular subject. निबंध
 - Account (noun) A report or description of an event or experience. विवरण
 - **Report** (noun) A formal statement or account describing an event or situation. प्रतिवेदन
- 18. D) Close the door

Active Voice में बदलने के लिए, Passive वाक्य के Object को Active वाक्य में शामिल करना होता है और Verb को आदेश या निर्देश के रूप में व्यवस्थित किया जाता है। Passive वाक्य "Let the door be closed" में: "The door" (Object) Passive वाक्य का मुख्य भाग है। "be closed" (Verb in Passive form) को Active में बदलने पर "Close the door" (Verb in Imperative form) बन जाता है। Passive वाक्य में आदेश का तात्पर्य Active में सीधे निर्देश देने से है। इसलिए, Active वाक्य "Close the door" (D) सही उत्तर है।

In the Passive sentence "Let the door be closed": "The door" (Object) is the main focus. "be closed" (Verb in Passive form) changes to "Close the door" (Verb in Imperative form) in the Active Voice. The implied command in the Passive is made explicit in the Active Voice as a direct instruction.
- 19. A) **Timid** (adjective) shy, bashful, reserved, diffident (डरपोक)

Synonym: **Nervous** (adjective) – anxious, lacking confidence (घबराया हुआ)

- Brave (adjective) courageous (साहसी)
- Bold (adjective) fearless, daring (निर्भीक)
- Daring (adjective) adventurous, audacious (साहसिक)

20. D) R, P, S, Q.

R starts the sentence with the subject "a quiet voice", introducing the main idea of the sentence—something that visits the speaker daily.

P follows R because it provides more details about the voice, specifying that it "belongs to a tiny squirrel" and describes its sound. This establishes a clear subject-description relationship.

S comes next as it continues the description of the squirrel's noise, explaining that it is "speaking a language without words but full of meaning." This logically follows P because it elaborates on how the sound communicates.

Q concludes the sentence by reflecting on the emotional impact of the chirps, describing them as "an untold story of survival." "Each chirp" refers back to the "gentle noise" from P and "speaking" from S, maintaining noun consistency.

In Hindi

- R sentence की शुरुआत करता है क्योंकि यह subject "a quiet voice" को introduce करता है, जो बताता है कि कौन-सी चीज़ (आवाज़) speaker के पास रोज़ आती है।
- P, R के बाद आता है क्योंकि यह "It" (यह) का उपयोग करके R के subject ("a quiet voice") से जुड़ता है और बताता है कि यह आवाज़ "एक गिलहरी की है"। Pronoun "It" पिछले वाक्य के subject को refer करता है।
- S, P के बाद आता है क्योंकि यह गिलहरी की आवाज़ के बारे में और बताता है—यह "शब्दों के बिना लेकिन अर्थ से भरी भाषा बोलती है।" Participle phrase ("speaking a language..."), P में बताई गई "gentle noise" को modify करता है।

- Q end में आता है क्योंकि यह "Each chirp" (हर चहक) को refer करता है और भावनात्मक अर्थ जोड़ता है। "Each chirp", P और S में बताई गई आवाज़ से जुड़ता है।
- 21. A) Prefer' का use होगा क्योंकि "prefer" का अर्थ है किसी चीज़ को अन्य विकल्पों की तुलना में प्राथमिकता देना। sentence में mention है कि saltwater crocodiles को mangrove-lined rivers में रहना पसंद है, इसलिए 'prefer' यहाँ सही विकल्प है। जबकि 'refer' का अर्थ है किसी चीज़ की ओर संकेत करना, 'defer' का अर्थ है स्थगित करना, और 'differ' का अर्थ है अलग होना, जो इस context में उपयुक्त नहीं है।
 - 'Prefer' will be used because it means to choose something as more desirable than other options. The sentence mentions that saltwater crocodiles like to live in mangrove-lined rivers, making 'prefer' the correct choice here. On the other hand, 'refer' means to indicate something, 'defer' means to postpone, and 'differ' means to be different, which are not suitable in this context.
- 22. C) 'Largest' का use होगा क्योंकि यह बताता है कि saltwater crocodiles सबसे बड़े जीवित सरीसृप हैं। passage में कहा गया है कि वे सात मीटर की लंबाई तक पहुंच सकते हैं, जो Komodo dragon (तीन मीटर तक) से बहुत बड़ा है। जबिक 'broadest' (सबसे चौड़ा), 'poorest' (सबसे गरीब), और 'fattest' (सबसे मोटा) इस context में उपयुक्त नहीं हैं क्योंकि ये शब्द सरीसृप के आकार या तुलना का सही वर्णन नहीं करते।
 - 'Largest' will be used because it indicates that saltwater crocodiles are the biggest living reptiles. The passage states that they can reach up to seven meters in length, far larger than the Komodo dragon, which tops out at three meters. On the other hand, 'broadest' refers to width, 'poorest' means lacking in quality or resources, and 'fattest' refers to excessive weight, none of which are suitable in this context.
- 23. B) 'Historically' का अर्थ है "इतिहास से संबंधित" या "इतिहास में किसी समय पर।" यह यहाँ उपयुक्त है क्योंकि sentence यह बता रहा है कि कभी समय पर इंडोनेशिया के पूरे द्वीप समूह में मगरमच्छ पाए जाते थे। यह sentence एक ऐतिहासिक संदर्भ देता है, इसलिए 'Historically' सही विकल्प है। जबिक: 'Abysmally' का अर्थ है "बहुत बुरी तरह से," जो यहाँ context में फिट नहीं होता। 'Fanatically' का अर्थ है "उत्साहपूर्वक या जुनून से," जो sentence के historical nature से मेल नहीं खाता। 'Acrobatically' का अर्थ है "कुशलता या निपुणता से," जो context में उपयुक्त नहीं है।
 - 'Historically' will be used because it means "related to history" or "at some point in the past." The sentence discusses how crocodiles were once found throughout the Indonesian archipelago, making it a historical reference. Thus, 'Historically' fits well. Whereas: 'Abysmally' means "terribly," which does not suit the context. 'Fanatically' means "with enthusiasm or obsession," which does not align with the sentence's historical tone. 'Acrobatically' means "with skill or dexterity," which is irrelevant in this context.
- 24. B) 'Records' का use होगा क्योंकि 'records' का अर्थ है दस्तावेज़ या प्रमाण, जो इस संदर्भ में फिट बैठता है। sentence में mention है कि हमारे पास मानवों पर हमलों के प्रमाण या

दस्तावेज़ हैं, जो सही है। जबिक 'recipes' का अर्थ है व्यंजन विधि, 'regiments' का अर्थ है सैन्य रेजिमेंट, और 'residues' का अर्थ है अवशेष, जो इस संदर्भ में उपयुक्त नहीं हैं।

- 'Records' will be used because it means documents or evidence, which fits the
 context. The sentence mentions that we have evidence or documentation of attacks
 on humans, making it the correct option. Whereas, 'recipes' means instructions for
 cooking, 'regiments' refers to military units, and 'residues' means remains, none of
 which fit in this context.
- 25. B) 'Residence' का use होगा क्योंकि इसका अर्थ है वह स्थान जहाँ कोई व्यक्ति या वस्तु निवास करता है। sentence में mention है कि जकार्ता की कई निवयों में मगरमच्छ पाए गए, जो उनके निवास स्थान को इंगित करता है। 'Resistance' का अर्थ है विरोध या किसी चीज़ को सहन करने की क्षमता, जो संदर्भ से संबंधित नहीं है। 'Relevance' का अर्थ है समीचीनता या प्रासंगिकता, जो निवास स्थान के विचार से मेल नहीं खाता। "Remembrance' का अर्थ है स्मरण, जो स्थान या आवास के संदर्भ में उपयुक्त नहीं है।
 - 'Residence' will be used because it refers to the place where someone or something lives or is located. The sentence mentions that crocodiles were found in many rivers running through Jakarta, which indicates the rivers were their residence. 'Resistance' means opposition or the ability to withstand, which is irrelevant to the context. 'Relevance' means the state of being closely connected or appropriate, which doesn't match the idea of a location where crocodiles lived. 'Remembrance' means the act of remembering, which also doesn't align with the context of a location or habitat.
