

For antibiotics, the right dose is **restraint**

India's **dependence** on antibiotics as a convenient cure-all for routine illnesses **has** reached an **inflection point**. A global **study** published in The Lancet Public Health **has highlighted** a worrying imbalance in the country's antibiotic use: An **over-reliance** on stronger medicines even as safer first-line medicines **remain underused**. The World Health Organisation **classifies** antibiotics into three categories — “access” drugs, which are recommended as first-line treatments for common infections; “watch” drugs, which are **broader-spectrum** medicines that should be reserved for specific situations; and “reserve” drugs, **intended** as **a last line of defence** against highly **resistant** infections. The study estimates India's **optimal** antibiotic use at 9.9 to 14.7 defined daily doses per 1,000 people per day. Actual **use**, however, **stands** much higher at 18.3 doses, with “watch” antibiotics at 9.3 doses against a recommended 6 doses. “Access” **antibiotics**, at 4.5 doses, **fall** well short of what is needed.

The **preference** for “watch” drugs **reveals** the challenge in how antibiotics are understood, prescribed and consumed. A **prescription** for a broad-spectrum antibiotic can often **feel** like **reassurance** both to a patient **seeking** quick recovery and to a doctor working in an **overstretched** healthcare system. But each unnecessary dose **narrows** the options available for future infections. At the same time, the **underuse** of “reserve” antibiotics in genuinely resistant cases **points to** another systemic failure: Ensuring that the right medicine reaches the right patient at the right moment. **Fragmented** healthcare delivery, poor diagnostic access, and — beyond the clinic — the **liberal** use of antibiotics in livestock and agriculture, all feed India's rising burden of antimicrobial resistance, where bacteria become resistant to common drugs and infections become more difficult and expensive to treat.

Given the country's **burden** of **infectious** disease, antibiotics **will** remain **indispensable**. **Addressing** the problem must, thus, **begin** with replacing **quick-fix** prescriptions with evidence-based care. National Action Plan on Antimicrobial Resistance 2.0 (2025–2029) places antimicrobial **stewardship at the heart of** the response, seeking to **curb** inappropriate usage across human healthcare, animal husbandry and agriculture. A stricter and more **coordinated** compliance **mechanism** across the pharmaceutical supply chain **is essential** to curb **indiscriminate** over-the-counter sales and **irrational** fixed-dose combinations.

- A) healthcare providers must shift from broad-spectrum shortcuts to systematic diagnostic treatments

This sentence in the question has two main parts: "Quick-fix prescriptions": Giving strong medicines as an easy shortcut for immediate satisfaction without investigating the actual cause. "Evidence-based care": Using scientific proof (diagnostics and clinical testing) to choose the exact right medicine for the patient. The passage defines "quick-fix" as doctors throwing broad-spectrum drugs at patients to get quick reassurance. Replacing this with "evidence-based care" means doctors must stop taking these broad-spectrum shortcuts and instead rely on systematic diagnostic testing to prescribe the correct treatment.

(b) — "antibiotics will remain indispensable." The passage never proposes home remedies replacing antibiotics.

(c) — passage never mentions "price caps" anywhere in the passage; the focus is on prescribing/diagnostic behavior, not pricing.

(d) — passage criticizes underuse of "reserve" drugs "in genuinely resistant cases," implying they need better-targeted use, not halted production.
- B) The researchers noted that the study estimated India's optimal antibiotic use at 9.9 to 14.7 defined daily doses per 1,000 people per day.**

The reporting verb ("noted") is in the past tense. Therefore, the verb inside the quotation marks ("estimates") must change from the simple present tense to the simple past tense ("estimated") to maintain correct tense agreement.

(a) is INCORRECT: It leaves the verb in simple present ("estimates"), failing to change the tense after a past tense reporting verb.

(c) is INCORRECT: It incorrectly shifts the internal verb to past perfect ("had estimated").

(d) is INCORRECT: It changes the reporting verb to present perfect ("have noted") and changes the main verb to past continuous ("was estimating").
- A) to indicate a critical turning point where current habits have reached a dangerous level requiring urgent policy intervention**

The passage opens with "India's dependence on antibiotics as a convenient cure-all for routine illnesses has reached an inflection point," immediately followed by details of a "worrying imbalance" — over-reliance on stronger "watch" drugs and underuse of "access" drugs. This is reinforced later by the passage's call for the National Action Plan and stricter compliance mechanisms, showing that "inflection point" signals a critical juncture demanding corrective action.

(b) — The passage doesn't describe any "mathematical peak" where access drugs "surpass" watch drugs; in fact, the data shows the opposite — access drugs remain underused (4.5 doses) while watch drugs are overused (9.3 doses).

(c) — The passage never discusses an "economic slump" or "manufacturing costs" of reserve drugs; it discusses their clinical underuse in resistant cases, not any cost-related issue.

(d) — The passage highlights that over-the-counter sales remain "indiscriminate" and that patients actively seek quick broad-spectrum prescriptions for reassurance, rather than refusing them.

4. D) non-clinical factors outside healthcare delivery that actively drive the growth of drug-resistant bacteria

Passage Line: "...and — beyond the clinic — the liberal use of antibiotics in livestock and agriculture, all feed India's rising burden of antimicrobial resistance..." In Paragraph 2, the author lists agricultural and livestock usage as an example of systemic drivers occurring outside human clinical settings ("beyond the clinic") that contribute directly to fueling the broader crisis of antimicrobial resistance.

(a) — The passage doesn't compare veterinary medicine's effectiveness to human medicine in reducing disease burden; livestock antibiotic use is mentioned only as a contributor to resistance, not as a comparative measure of treatment efficacy.

(b) — The passage frames livestock antibiotic use as a problem contributing to resistance, not a "successful" disease-prevention strategy; there's no mention of it preventing transmission "successfully" among farm animals.

(c) — The passage doesn't discuss pharmaceutical companies' manufacturing priorities or "growth promoters" as an economic motive; it simply cites agricultural antibiotic use as a resistance-driving factor, without economic analysis of drug makers' incentives

5. A) **Critical yet pragmatic**

Critical: Evaluating something by pointing out its specific faults, mistakes, or systemic flaws. Pragmatic: Focusing on practical, realistic solutions based on real-world conditions.

Critical: "a worrying imbalance in the country's antibiotic use" — direct criticism of the current state. "each unnecessary dose narrows the options available for future infections" — pointed warning about consequences "points to another systemic failure" — explicitly names the problem as a failure. "Fragmented healthcare delivery, poor diagnostic access" — critical listing of specific systemic weaknesses

Pragmatic:

- "antibiotics will remain indispensable" — acknowledges practical reality rather than condemning antibiotic use outright. "Addressing the problem must, thus, begin with replacing quick-fix prescriptions with evidence-based care" — offers a constructive path forward. Reference to the "National Action Plan on Antimicrobial Resistance 2.0" and "antimicrobial stewardship" — points to concrete, existing solutions. "A stricter and more coordinated compliance mechanism... is essential" — ends with an actionable recommendation.

 - Sentence A follows Sentence C because the narrator's confusion ("wrongly mentioning 3 BHW") acts as a direct logical link, pointing specifically back to the text on the board introduced in C to detail the narrator's immediate reaction.
 - Sentence D follows Sentence A as a logical chronological progression, elaborating on the potential "mistake" mentioned in A by describing how the narrator entered the home out of curiosity and discovered it was actually a deliberate replacement of the letter "K" with "W".
 - Sentence B concludes the passage by providing a specific description. It serves as a direct expansion, pointing exactly back to the deliberate replacement mentioned in Sentence D to detail the posh workstation that had replaced the kitchen.

Sentence 4 Sentence 2 के बाद आएगा क्योंकि इसमें इस्तेमाल हुआ phrase "The two sides" एक सीधा grammatical link है, जो Sentence 2 में introduce किए गए India और Japan (India-Japan Annual Summit) को point करता है, और उनके commitment को बताता है।

B) **Trouble** का use होगा क्योंकि "trouble" का अर्थ होता है परेशानी या समस्या में पड़ना। Sentence में यह विरोधाभासी (ironic) स्थिति को दर्शाता है कि जब भी बॉस कोई अच्छा विचार लाते हैं, वह परेशानी में पड़ जाते हैं। जबकि 'Sleep' का अर्थ है सोना, 'Fun' का मतलब है मनोरंजन और 'Shock' का अर्थ है आघात, जो इस context में फिट नहीं बैठते।

- Trouble' should be used because it signifies getting into problems or difficulties. The sentence indicates an ironic situation where whenever the boss comes up with a good idea, he ends up in trouble. Whereas, 'Sleep' means to rest, 'Fun' refers to enjoyment, and 'Shock' indicates a sudden upset, which do not fit in this context.

18. B) **Illness** (noun) – A disease or period of sickness affecting the body or mind. बीमारी
Synonym: Sickness (noun) – The state of being ill; ill health. अस्वस्थता

- **Disturbance** (noun) – An interruption of a state of peace or quiet. व्याकुलता
- **Disintegration** (noun) – The process of losing cohesion or strength. विघटन
- **Disorder** (noun) – A state of confusion or a lack of organization; an ailment or illness. अव्यवस्था

19. C) **has gone** का प्रयोग होगा क्योंकि 'is gone' का प्रयोग grammatically सही नहीं है जब किसी के किसी जगह जाने की बात हो; 'has gone' का प्रयोग Present Perfect Tense के लिए किया जाता है जब कोई कार्य हाल ही में समाप्त हुआ हो और उसका प्रभाव वर्तमान पर पड़ रहा हो; जैसे— He has gone to the market.

- 'has gone' will be used instead of 'is gone' because 'is gone' is not grammatically correct when referring to someone going to a place; 'has gone' is used for Present Perfect Tense when an action has recently finished and has an impact on the present; Like — He has gone to the market.

20. A) **The coach gave the team instructions.**

Passive से Active Voice में बदलते समय Passive sentence का Subject, Active sentence का Object बन जाता है और “by” के बाद आने वाला doer Active sentence का Subject बनता है। यहाँ “Instructions” Passive sentence का Subject है और “the coach” doer है। Verb “were given” Simple Past Passive में है, इसलिए Active Voice में यह “gave” (Simple Past) बनेगा। Indirect object “the team” यथावत रहेगा। इसलिए सही Active form होगा — “The coach gave the team instructions.”

- To change a sentence from Passive to Active Voice, the subject of the passive sentence becomes the object of the active sentence, and the doer introduced by “by” becomes the subject. Here, “Instructions” is the subject of the passive sentence and “the coach” is the doer. The verb “were given” is in the Simple Past Passive form, so in Active Voice it changes into “gave” in the Simple Past tense. The indirect object “the team” remains unchanged. Therefore, the correct active form is — “The coach gave the team instructions.”

21. A) **devoured**

Devoured literally means to eat hungrily or quickly, but here it is used metaphorically to mean that the river violently and completely consumed or destroyed the house. Elected means to choose by voting, which makes no sense here. Surrendered means to give up or yield to an opponent, and Yield means to produce or give way, neither of which makes logical sense when describing a river's destructive action on a house.

22. C) **erode**

Erode means to gradually wear away or destroy, and it is used here as a metaphor: just as a river erodes the physical land, the legal hurdles are now slowly destroying (eroding) his citizenship. Enhance (to improve), Elevate (to raise), and Improve (to make better) are all highly positive words that completely contradict the negative context of "threatening to" take away his rights.

Adjudged means to formally declare, decide, or pronounce something legally in a court or by a tribunal, and it is used here because the sentence describes a specific, completed event in the past ("On February 28, 2019"), which strictly requires the simple past tense (second form of the verb). Adjudge and Adjudges are present-tense forms, which grammatically break the timeline of an event that happened in 2019. Adjudging is a continuous "-ing" form that cannot act as the main verb without an auxiliary helping verb (like "was").

Under is used because it is the exact, standard English preposition used in legal and official contexts to mean "in accordance with" or "governed by the rules of" a specific law (e.g., created under the

25. A) is

Is is a singular present-tense linking verb and is used here because the true grammatical subject of the sentence is the pronoun "One" (which is singular), not the plural noun "provisions." The phrase "of the key provisions" is merely a prepositional phrase attached to "One." A singular subject strictly requires a singular present-tense verb ("is"). Are and Were are plural verbs, directly violating subject-verb agreement. Have is plural and also breaks the grammatical structure (you would need an infinitive or participle).

- यहाँ Is का use किया जाएगा क्योंकि sentence का असली subject "One" है, जो singular है ("provisions" subject नहीं है, वह तो preposition 'of' का object है)। Singular subject के साथ हमेशा singular verb आती है। Are और Were plural verbs हैं, इसलिए ये subject-verb agreement के rules के खिलाफ हैं। Have भी plural है, इसलिए यह पूरी तरह गलत है।
